# WHERE AM I?

- 1. "An election to an office becomes final immediately if the candidate is present and does not decline, or if he is absent but has consented to his candidacy, the election becomes final when he is notified of his election, provided that he does not immediately decline."
- 2. "It is the right of every member who notices a breach of the rules to insist on their enforcement."
- 3. "If no method of making nominations is designated by the bylaws or rules and the assembly has adopted no order on the subject, anyone can make a motion prescribing the method of nomination for an office to be filled."
- 4. "If the chair only *suspects* that a motion is not made in good faith, he should give the maker of the motion the benefit of the doubt. The chair should always be courteous and fair, but at the same time he should be firm in protecting the assembly from imposition."
- 5. "In certain tax-exempt organizations of a charitable or educational character, federal and state tax laws must be adhered to in the disposal of the organization's assets. Often such assets are distributed to societies with similar objectives, or to a superior body."

# 2023 NAP Biennial Convention Provides Adventure in Education

September 5-9 in Atlanta, Georgia, provided those attending with an interesting look at the future of the National Association of Parliamentarians. The adventure began with the bylaws forum where many questions were addressed in regard to the proposed bylaw amendments. The 44<sup>th</sup> Biennial Convention began at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday with presentations from the NAP partnerships. I was asked as NAPEF President to present the welcome to the convention from the NAP Educational Foundation. Notice was also given for a nine-tenths bylaw amendment to dissolve the Commission on Credentialing. This amendment was never presented as the convention adjourned before its presentation. Notice was also given for a special order to censure the NAP Board of Directors for lack of due process in regard to their actions taken last year in relieving four Commission of Credentialing members of their positions. The motion was adopted at a later session.

The following actions were taken on the proposed bylaw amendments that were considered.

Amendment 1 was adopted with proposed amendment from the Bylaws Committee to allow for the conversion from an existing unit to an electronic unit.

Amendment 2 was adopted with proposed amendment from the Bylaws Committee to allow credentialed members to market themselves as long as they continue to meet all requirements for the classification.

Amendment 3 was adopted to include the district directors as members of the International Services Committee.

Amendment 4 was lost to decrease dues for international members

Amendment 5 was postponed indefinitely to establish minimum requirements as stated for RP and PRP.

Amendment 6 was adopted with proviso for retention of the RP credential grandfathering in the current ending year as stated on the RP's credential certification last received.

Amendment 7 was adopted with proviso for the reinstatement of PRP credential grandfathering in certified individuals using the current stated date for renewal.

Amendment 8 was postponed indefinitely maintaining the Commission on Credentialing's authority to administer the credentialing program allowing the Commission and Board to remain separate.

Amendment 9 was postponed indefinitely to allow only PRPs to serve on committees of the Commission of Credentialing.

Amendment 10 was postponed indefinitely attempting to redefine the term of four years for the Commission on Credentialing.

Amendment 11 was adopted allowing the Commission on Credentialing to elect the chairman, vice chairman and secretary for a two-year term.

Amendment 12 was adopted to allow the Commission on Credentialing to submit bylaw amendments.

Amendment 13 was lost as a result not allowing the voting body of NAP to include the Commission of Credentialing—suggesting a 501C6 classification for the Commission on Credentialing.

Amendment 14 was lost with a tie vote which would have allowed only PRPs to serve on the Commission on Credentialing.

Amendment 15 was postponed indefinitely which would have allowed only PRPs holding a credential for two years to serve on the Commission on Credentialing.

Amendment 16 was adopted allowing the NAP Board of Directors to resolve all appeals by a respondent of a reprimand issued by the professional standards committee. The member in question could permanently be ineligible for membership.

Amendment 17 was lost and highly contested to not allow Provisionals in associations and units. We can keep the Provisionals!!

Amendment 18 was lost therefore maintaining the rights of associations and units to include Provisionals

Amendment 19 was adopted that the NAP Board of Directors may remove commission members for cause by a vote of two-thirds by roll call vote and in open session and following disciplinary proceedings as provided in the parliamentary authority.

Amendment 20 also included Amendment 19 and included adding in accordance with the due process procedure in the NAP Standing Rules.

Amendment 21 was not considered.

The assembly witnessed several appeals from the decision of the chair, some of which were not sustained.

The following were elected for this biennium: Alison Wallis, PRP, President; Carl Nohr, PRP, Vice President; Mona Calhoun, PRP, Secretary; Robert Shuck, PRP, Treasurer; Beth James, PRP, Steven Cook, PRP, and Tamara Harris, PRP, Directors-at-Large; Deb Underwood, PRP and Lucy Anderson, PRP, District Directors Representatives. Ron Stinson, PRP, Past President of NAP conducted the installation ceremony. The following were also elected to the Commission on Credentialing for four years: David Jackson, PRP, Sandra Cook, PRP, and Steven Walls, PRP. Sandy Olson, PRP and Henry Lawton, PRP were elected to the Commission on Credentialing for two years. Darlene Allen will serve as the chairmen of the Commission on Credentialing for two years.

The NAP Educational Foundation celebrated its forty years of existence with the presentation of a birthday cake. The Foundation's annual meeting was held and allowed contributors to learn about the newly proposed agreements with NAP and the Foundation's continued pledge to assist in improving the educational development and programs for NAP members. The Foundation fundraiser with the trip to Truist Park and a Braves-Pirates ballgame was enjoyed by the 125 people attending the game in the Hank Aaron Terrace. The Braves won!!

Star City received the Membership Extension and Retention Award for the greatest number of unit education workshop in District Five. Lynna Gene Cook, PRP, was also recognized for her position as Chair and work on the NAP Style, Editing, and Proofreading Committee.

Nebraska again contributed to the Saturday workshops by hosting four workshops on Presiding and Serving as a Parliamentarian with 67 members attending the workshops. Sandy Olson, PRP, served as the coordinator of the labs with Lynna Gene Cook, PRP assisting with the four labs and John Heineman, RP assisting with one lab. The evaluations from the labs were very complimentary toward requesting the labs for the future and expressing appreciation for the opportunity to practice their skills.


